Interdisciplinary approach is implemented in both UG and PG Courses. The course commercial mathematics and statistics is taught to the first year B Com students. The Course in Business Communication is imparted to the second year B Com students. The syllabi of literature both in Marathi and English blend the concepts from history, sociology, philosophy, psychology, political science and culture studies. The courses environmental awareness, cyber security and human rights are interdisciplinary in nature. The subjects botany, physics, chemistry, mathematics cut across disciplines and have interdisciplinary contents at

16.Academic bank of credits (ABC):

The system of Academic Bank of Credits is implemented from the academic year 2022-23. The students were personally counselled on need and advantages of the system. They were also shown Youtube videos on opening ABC Id. These were also shared on Whatsapp groups of the enrolled students.

17.Skill development:

Skill development is a component of syllabi. Skill based courses are imparted at UG and PG levels. Students earn credits by means of project work, study tours, industrial visits and S P Pune University approved certificate courses. Skill based component is integrated into curriculum at UG level also. A mandatory skill based paper is included in the syllabus of all subjects in the arts faculty. The College has signed MoUs with the industries and academic institutions to develop professional and social skills of the students. DMLT course is implemented under UGC's NSQF and Community College Scheme. The course emphasizes on-hand job training. Along with the technical skills. Communication is also one of the components of the syllabi. The course English for Careers is prescibed to UG students of Special English. It aims at developing language skills required in job- markets. The component of soft- skills is introduced in the course of compulsory English in every year at UG level.

18.Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course)

According to the guidelines of the UGC, Marathi is imparted as a Modern Indian Language to the second year UG students of Arts in regular offline mode. The topics- ethnobotany and economic botany are imparted in the course of Botany. The critical concepts from Indian Literary Theory like Ras Siddhant are included in the syllabi of MA English. The concepts from ancient Indian theatre are part of UG syllabus for the students of special English. Girish Karnad's play The Fire and The Rain which is based on Arnyak-Parva of the Mahabharat is prescibed to the UG students. A special course on translated works from Indian languages is taught at PG level. The course includes translations from Hindi, Urdu, Marathi and South Indian Languages also. .

19. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE): Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):

The OBE model aims to maximize student learning outcomes by developing their knowledge & skills. Outcome-based education is a

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skill-oriented system and it is implemented in the College. Skill development is an integral part of academic syllabi. The College regularly conducts the academic activities such as industrial visits, study tours, internship, project work and certificate courses to provide skill education to the stakeholders. In the last two years SPPU has introduced skill advancement courses across all the subjects at the undergraduate level. These components connect the academic syllabi with the social professional and other types of needs and help in enhancing the value of education.

20.Distance education/online education:

SPPU, Pune also conducts UG and PG courses in Arts and Commerce through the distance mode. The College runs the distance education centre of Yashwantrao Chavan Maharashtra Open University, Nashik. (YCMOU) The centre facilitates the undergraduate and postgraduate courses in arts, commerce and library and information sciences. In the year 2022-23 five hundred forty three students (UG-439 PG-104) enrolled at the centre. The people working in different government and private sectors, the housewives and the drop-out students are the beneficiaries of the YCMOU Centre. The students are provided the opportunity of participating in the sports activities also.

The colour coded dust bins are kept in the College campus for degradable and non- degradable waste. The dry waste bins are also placed in laboratories, library, classrooms, etc. The dry and wet waste is handed over the Nagar Parishad for further treatment. The scrap materials are given for recycling to external agencies. Solid waste is separated according to need and processed further depending on the nature of waste. Organic and other types of wastes are converted into biofertilizer by the Vermicomposting plant developed by the department of Botany. Dry waste mainly leaf litter is allowed to decompose systematically over a period and then is transferred to the vermicompost plant. Extremely hazardous chemicals are not used in the laboratories. Liquid wastes are diluted before their disposal. The waste water released by the

water purifiers is used for plants and for cleaning purposes. The process of autoclaving is used in thelaboratories. The College has signed an MoU with Sai-Infotech an approved organization for disposal of e- waste. To minimize the e-waste the reuse of gadgets is encouraged. Refilling the toner cartridges of printers is outsourced and the toners are reused to limit the waste.
